

In the article, Caitlin mentions a couple of Scottish road safety events with particular mention of the involvement of IAM Roadsmart, when there were equally important road safety events with RoADAR involvement. A driver survey report by Brake and AXA UK to find out about

drivers' attitudes towards seat belts and safety systems in cars

Seat belts are one of the simplest and most effective ways to protect ourselves when travelling by car, yet many drivers and passengers are compromising their own safety – and the safety of those travelling with them – by choosing not to belt up on every journey.

Brake surveyed 2,016 car drivers about seat belts and other passive safety systems to prevent injury in a road crash. The survey was carried out in February 2024 by independent market research company, SurveyGoo.

This report highlights concern for the small but significant proportion of drivers who don't wear a seat belt on every journey, risking the safety of themselves, their passengers and other road users

It's worrying to see that young and male drivers are less likely to always wear a seat belt, both when driving and travelling as a passenger.

Young and newly qualified drivers are high-risk road users and often over-represented in collision data. In Britain, drivers aged 17–24 make up only 6% of total licence holders yet represent 18% of all car drivers killed and seriously injured. In 2022, 30% of young people aged 17–29 who died on roads weren't wearing a seat belt.

Unfortunately, one year on from Brake's 2024 campaign, the message has not made any difference. New analysis published this year by The AA Charitable Trust shows almost half (43%) of young passengers (17-29 years) who are killed in car crashes are not belted. Wearing a seatbelt reduces the risk of death by around 50%, meaning up to around one quarter of all young car passenger deaths could be avoided if all young passengers put their belts on.

One simple strategy which may impact on this issue, is to develop technology to prevent the vehicle from starting if all required seatbelts are not fastened.
